This service has increased staff skills and confidence in facilitating outdoor learning. We want the children to feel comfortable working within our wonderful surroundings and enjoy being outside with nature and the natural environment.</p>	<p>KS2 teaching staff</p>	<p>Key indicator 3: Increased confidence, knowledge and skills of all staff in teaching PE and sport</p>	<p>A specialist Forest Schools' Provider was employed to work alongside teaching and support staff. All children from Year 1 to Year 6 benefited from blocks of half-day sessions.</p> <p>This provision secured coverage of the Outdoor and Adventurous Activity element of the PE curriculum and utilised the School's outdoor environment to enhance and support curriculum learning.</p> <p>This has led to enhanced learning in the OAA area of the curriculum and has expanded children's learning around classroom topics. Create further sports provision	£6000	Children will have a range of sports led by specialist staff. Other staff will be observing and this will help with modelling of good practice

Key indicator 2: The profile of PESSPA being raised across the school as a tool for whole school improvement.

Intent	Cost	Impact
Replenish equipment. We require new equipment in order to sustain high quality PE delivery.	£2000	Children will continue to have the required equipment to take part in high quality PE lessons.
To replenish equipment and create more activities for the children to do at playtimes and lunchtimes (EYFS/Y1 area and Y2-6 area).	£1000	Children will be more actively engaged in physical activity at playtimes and lunchtimes.

Key indicator 3: Increased confidence, knowledge and skills of all staff in teaching PE and sport.

Intent	Estimated cost	Impact
<p>Forest Schools</p> <p>A specialist Forest Schools' Provider will continue to be employed to work alongside teaching and support staff. All children from Year1 to Year 6 will benefit from blocks of full-day sessions. Children will be using the wonderful surroundings of Oakworth to engage in Outdoor and Adventurous Activity whilst supporting their curriculum learning.</p>	£6000	Staff should feel more comfortable in working in the natural environment and local woodlands. It will expand children's learning around their classroom topics.

Key indicator 4: Broader experience of a range of sports and activities offered to all pupils.

<i>Transport – To attend the Brownlee Triathlon, Ilkley cup and other local events.</i>	<i>£500</i>	<i>This will allow children to compete in a triathlon and watch professionals compete.</i>

<i>Transport – To allow children to take part in competitive sport through the local pathway tournaments.</i>	<i>£500</i>	<i>This will allow children to compete against a range of opposition and at a higher level.</i>
